Since independence, in the 1960s, most African countries have been trying to promote economic growth and development. In seeking to promote economic development on the continent, African countries have enlisted the support and cooperation of different countries from the rest of the world, especially the former colonising countries. In this seminar, we specifically focus on the role of China, Japan and Russia in Africa's development trajectory so far. These three countries have played different roles at different times in Africa's development journey. This seminar highlights the different roles these three countries have played in Africa's development approach, arguing that while Japan has consistently followed the conventional international donor model, the other two countries' engagement in Africa's development has varied over time.
